WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?



O sing a new song to the Lord, for he has worked wonders; in the sight of the nations he has shown his deliverance, alleluia.

Cf. Ps 98 (97): 1-2

This week I was reading through the section of the Code of Canon Law (the law of the Church) on the responsibilities of a pastor. This section (CIC 529 §2) jumped out at me:

A pastor is to recognize and promote the proper part which the lay members of the Christian faithful have in the mission of the Church, by fostering their associations for the purposes of religion. He is to cooperate with his own bishop and the presbyterium of the diocese, also working so that the faithful have concern for parochial communion, consider themselves members of the diocese and of the



universal Church, and participate in and sustain efforts to promote this same communion.

It may be tempting to think of ourselves as the 'us' to the 'they' of the archdiocese, the archbishop, the pope, or even the Church at large.

'They' do things one way, 'we' do things our way. 'They' aren't 'us', so we feel free dismiss 'them', going our own way.

Jesus reminds us that "Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me." If we have rejected our connection to Christ, the Church and the successors to the Apostles who govern Her, we reject Christ! May we carefully work and faithfully pray for unity, that we may be one in the Lord.

This Monday, May 3rd, we celebrate the feast of two Apostles: Saints Philip and James (the lesser or 'the Just').

Philip was one of the first called by Christ and in his zeal invited Nathaniel - answering



Nathaniel's doubt simply: 'Come and see'

After the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, James remained and served as bishop there. He was called 'James the Just' due to his purity, mortification, and prayer.

You may be aware that clergy are required by Church law (CIC 276 §2 4/) to take an annual retreat. Unlike vacation time, a retreat is an opportunity to withdraw from daily work and worldly distractions in order to focus on one's relationship with the Lord. A typical clergy retreat involves time for holy hours, spiritual reading, and time in quiet prayer.

All this to say that along with a brother priest,

I will be going on my annual retreat over this coming week. Rest assured of my prayers for you throughout.







Hope after a difficult year

A little over a year ago, standing alone in an empty St. Peter's Square, Pope Francis addressed a frightened and anxious world describing the emerging coronavirus pandemic as a storm.

"The storm exposes our vulnerability and uncovers those false and superfluous certainties around which we have constructed our daily schedules, our projects, our habits and priorities. It shows us how we have allowed to become dull and feeble the very things that nourish, sustain and strengthen our lives and our communities. The tempest lays bare all our prepackaged ideas and forgetfulness of what nourishes our people's souls; all those attempts that anesthetize us with ways of thinking and acting that supposedly 'save' us, but instead prove incapable of putting us in touch with our roots and keeping alive the memory of those who have gone before us. We deprive ourselves of the antibodies we need to confront adversity."

As the storm of the coronavirus begins to abate, Pope Francis knows that we must return to what truly nourishes our souls: encounter with God. He is calling us to meet the Lord in the Eucharist and in our families.

What is the Year of the Family?

Pope Francis established the Year of the Family on March 19, 2021, the solemnity of St. Joseph. This also marks the fifth anniversary of the publication of his apostolic exhortation Amoris Laetitia ("The joy of love"), which explores the beauty and joy found in family life. The Year of the Family will conclude on June 26, 2022, which is the start of the 10th World Meeting of Families in Rome.

Why did Pope Francis establish it in addition to Year of St. Joseph?

When he announced the Year of the Family, Pope Francis said, "Let us entrust this journey with the families of the whole world to the Holy Family of Nazareth, in particular to St. Joseph, attentive spouse and father." Both the Year of the Family and the Year of St. Joseph are ways for families and parents to grow in love with God and each other, with the Holy Family as their example.

Why is *Amoris Laetitia* important to you and your family?

In this Year of the Family, Pope Francis invites us to listen to the invitation he offered in Amoris Laetitia again: "an invitation to Christian families to value the gifts of marriage and the family, and to persevere in a love strengthened by the virtues of generosity, commitment, fidelity and patience." Amoris Laetitia is important to all families as it emphasizes the family's vocation and mission of love and explains what this means in everyday life. It also addresses the challenges families face in today's world, the day-to-day reality of family life, and how to accompany and care for each other with Christ's mercy and healing.




How your family can live the joy of God's love more deeply

- 2. Let your children know Jesus is really there. If your children wonder why should they go to Mass rather than watch it online, let them know that when we receive the Eucharist, we really receive Jesus in the host and it helps us grow closer to him and love him and others better.
