As Catholics approach the polls, we are asked to weigh many important issues. The U.S. bishops have reaffirmed that "the threat of abortion remains our preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family, and because of the number of lives destroyed." While they did warn us not to "dismiss or ignore other serious threats to human life and dignity such as racism, the environmental crisis, poverty, and the death penalty," they did give priority to upholding and defending our brothers' and sisters' most basic right—to live.

Abortion tragically ends someone's life when he or she is most vulnerable and most in need of loving protection. Abortion is an intrinsic evil, meaning that it is never permitted or morally justified, regardless of individual circumstances or intentions. The personal and societal consequences of attacks against human life,

whether at its earliest stages or at its final stages, are all the more serious because most often they are "carried out in the very heart of and with the complicity of the family—the family which by its nature is called to be the 'sanctuary of life.'" This is the place where a person should be *most* loved, cherished, and protected.

Catholics are called to defend human life wherever it is threatened and stand up for human dignity wherever it is violated. The enormous number of human lives destroyed by abortion is one factor that elevates its importance. Beginning in 1973 with *Roe v. Wade*, and during the nearly



50-year period after *Roe* in which the Supreme Court forbade state prohibitions on abortion, nearly 64 million children have been killed—and untold numbers of women and men suffer in the aftermath.<sup>3</sup>

Even with the overturning of *Roe v. Wade* in June 2022, a decision that returns the abortion issue to the electorate, many states continue not to recognize children in their mothers' wombs

as persons warranting protection under the law. Federal laws in our country fail to protect the lives of unborn children, and many political leaders at the state and federal level, work actively to increase access to abortion. Some falsely describe it as health care and even as a basic human right.4

People of good will must boldly stand up against this intrinsic evil, especially when it is occurring on a massive scale, implemented in law and funded, in some instances, by the government. As believers and citizens inspired by the Gospel and guided by the shepherds of our Church, we must



do what we can to end violence in the womb, to ensure that unborn children are fully recognized and protected by our laws, and to support mothers and fathers in embracing life.



# WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Let my prayer come into your presence. Incline your ear to my cry for help, O Lord.

Cf. Ps 88 (87): 3

In the secular world, perhaps the greatest value is 'winning'. What that actually means often varies - maybe its power, money, position, or something else altogether. Losing is to be avoided at all costs even if victory if pyhrric.

Movie buffs will remember, the quote 'but for Wales' from *A Man for All Seasons* - illustrating the folly of this outlook - particularly for Christians, who know that victory is found in

Christ alone.



Today's first reading illustrates the victory of faith in a way that confounds civil society: the torture & death of seven brothers - in front of their mother, no less - before her own execution by the king.

Far from being simply a story of

defeat and loss, their martyrdom for their faith in God is an example such that it is enshrined in Scripture and read at Mass to inspire us all.

In today's Gospel, the Sadducees were more interested in scoring points than sincerely receiving the teaching of Jesus. We do well to see the cautionary tale in their actions and look to the example of the Maccabees, the saints, and the Lord Himself as our model of sacrificial witness - and true victory!

Just after the turn of the century, the United States bishops wrote a document titled *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*. Updated regularly, this document is meant to assist



Catholics in their responsibility and duty to contribute to civil society, especially in voting.

The bishops recently remind us that 'the threat of abortion remains our preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself'. May we take special care to discern how we may uphold the dignity of every person, from conception to natural death.

November 9 is the feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica. On this day the Church makes special effort to recall her unity with the Holy Father. Though Pope Francis is physically far from most Catholics, we remember him in prayer at every Mass!

The Lateran Basilica is notable for many things, not the least that it is the cathedral of the Bishop of Rome. Visually, visitors will immediately notice the larger-than-life statues of the Apostles, who faithfully passed on the
